### IN MEMORIAM LINDA H. WAGSTAFF

November 7, 1952 - August 31, 2019 (By Sue Robertson)

I know that I cannot do justice in paying tribute to Linda Hart Wagstaff, my friend of 45 years. We met when Linda began her Latin teaching career at Robious Junior High School in Chesterfield County in 1974. Because her school fed into mine, we immediately began to work together on Latin curriculum, to travel abroad together, and we became more than working colleagues, friends whom each other could count on through thick and thin. Five years later, Linda helped to open Monacan High School where she taught for the next 40 years.



When I think of Linda, here are some things that come to mind: Linda was a perfectionist, and hence, proof-reading was her specialty. I remember how she poured over every word of every curriculum guide that she worked on as well as the 2004 NJCL program for errors. And, even on the day before she passed, she wanted to read every word of her retirement papers before she signed them.

Linda was known for her strong academics, not only for herself, but for motivating her students to achieve at high levels. Most language programs have grown slower-paced over the years, but Linda not only managed to finish the book per level with her students, but her students learned much and won many awards – proving that when you set the bar high, students will rise to the occasion. From NLE, CAV, and JCL awards to other selective competitions such as the Monmouth College Bernice Fox Writing Contest, her students were top winners. In 1999, the Richmond Times-Dispatch and Randolph-Macon College sponsored a writing contest on the Greek democracy and how it has affected our society.

Ten students were to be recognized, and the first place winner would be the recipient of a trip to Athens, Greece to participate in an archeological dig. Linda's students took six of the ten places in the competition, including FIRST PLACE. Linda also played on the faculty team that would help prepare students for the Academic Bowl, and she loved Jeopardy and obviously, Certamen. There was a time period when we shared buses to go to the various Certamina throughout the state.

Linda might have appeared as a strict teacher as she definitely was a rule follower, but she had a heart of gold. Her students knew that they could count on her for everything and anything, and Linda never, ever was too busy to help a student or colleague. Her compassion and generosity could literally fill a room. I don't remember all of the details, but when Linda served as VJCL co-chair, apparently, there were some financial issues. Linda paid for a lot of the convention expenses one year, and to this day I am not sure that she was ever reimbursed. Linda kept her Latin Club dues very inexpensive so that everyone could join. However, she wanted to make sure there were delicious refreshments at every meeting, which meant she funded majority of the refreshments, and she never turned students away, even if they weren't club members.

When I think of NJCL Conventions, there are so many stories that could be told, but the first one that comes to memory was the University of Tennessee one around 1980. It was the Day in Old Rome and we were all dressed in Roman attire, and one of my students ended up in the ER. Linda and I ran several blocks to the hospital, and showed up out of breath, dressed like Roman women, and on a Friday night in the emergency room. We certainly added to the Friday night drama. Everything ended up fine, but this was before cell phones and easy communication. So, you can imagine the hassle.

Because we traveled abroad from 1975 to 2013 (at least every other year and sometimes every year), we added many memories to laugh about, even though some were not very laughable at the time. From one of her boys leaving his size 13 dress shoes under his bed in Ostia to one losing his passport, there were never dull moments. But, we often had large groups with us, and hence, one of us would lead the group and be at the front with our courier, and the other was in the rear trying to keep the herd together. One time, I heard Linda yelling, "Watch your back pocket!" And she was racing towards the middle of the group to shoo away an Italian teenager who was about to pickpocket the student. Even though we tried to get our students to wear neck wallets with their money and passports in them, this particular young man was "too cool" to do so. Needless to say, he was full of thanks for his eagle eyed teacher, whom he and many others fondly referred to as "The Wag."

And, the last memory I will share is one that does not really involve Latin. Chesterfield County had a bowling league at one time. Linda and I helped to fill a team called M&M for Monacan and Midlothian. There were two science teachers on the team from Midlo, and then there were Linda and I, who were not really bowlers. Yet, they were happy to have us as we increased their handicap by a lot. So, we bowled together every Wednesday for a number of years before our children were born, and we even have a few trophies to show for that time in our lives.

Thank you for allowing me to reminisce about a devoted colleague and very special friend who served our organization as the Tournament Registrar for a number of years and received the Angela Lloyd award in 2012. May Linda Hart Wagstaff always be remembered and loved by those whose lives she touched over her stellar career! Ave atque vale, amica carissima.

### **RULES:**

- 1. Each essay should have a cover sheet which includes:
  - a) The full name of the contestant;
  - b) Full home address:
  - c) Name of Latin teacher:
  - d) Name and address of school.
- 2. The contestant's name should appear in the upper right-hand corner of the essay.
- 3. No help from any person is permitted in the preparation of this essay. Reference books may be used, such as those on grammar, dictionaries, and volumes on ancient literature and culture. Provide a bibliography of any works consulted at the end of the essay.
- 4. Judging will be based both upon the content of the essay and on Latin usage, but the correctness of the Latin will be the most important single factor. Contestants should make a conscious effort to incorporate as many as possible of the new syntactical features of the Latin language that they have encountered for the first time in the level of Latin for which they are currently enrolled.
- 5. The names of the winners in each competition and of those receiving honorable mention will be announced at the spring meeting of the CAV in May. Entries will not be returned after judging. By entering this competition students are giving the CAV permission to publish their names and/or essays in any of the official publications. This permission is given unless a student makes a written request to the contrary.

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## 2020 CLASSICAL ESSAY CONTEST

- The CAV Classical Essay Contest is designed to recognize those students who have submitted outstanding essays in English on a topic appropriate to each level or class.
- The contest is open to students in the public and private middle and high schools of Virginia, and homeschoolers, whose teachers are **current** members of the Classical Association of Virginia.
- Essays shall be submitted in **English** on the following topics in the following divisions:

**Level 1:** The Lion King: The Birth and Ascendance of Romulus

Level 2: My Fair Lady: The Story of Pygmalion and Galatea

**Level 3:** Beauty and the Beast: The Myth of Cupid and Psyche

Advanced Latin (Level 3+)

**Vergil:** Mamma Mia: The Role of Venus in the *Aeneid* 

**<u>History:</u>** Hamilton: The Life of Publius Valerius Publicola and the Founding of the Republic

**<u>Poetry:</u>** Hadestown: Orpheus and Eurydice, the Power of Orpheus (both Ovid and Vergil's versions

accepted)

As before: students who are in their third year of Latin who choose to do the general third year topic will be judged only with other Third Year students. They may also submit an essay in one of the advanced topics.

Essays should be roughly 1000 words, typed double space on single sides of the page.

The first page of the essay may include a title. The student's name should not appear on any page of the essay, and the pages of the essay should be numbered.

Each entry must come with a <u>COVER PAGE</u> (it is recommended that contestants use the <u>COVER SHEET</u> **FORM** available on the CONTESTS section of the CAV webpage). The COVER PAGE shall include:

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## CLASSICAL ASSOCIATION OF VIRGINIA THE 90TH ANNUAL LATIN TOURNAMENT

## **EXAMINATIONS:**

The exams are designed to test the student's mastery of the Latin language and, in the case of the upper level exams, some basic literary matter at that particular level of study. Exams will consist of questions on vocabulary, forms, syntax, (where appropriate) rhetorical and poetic devices, and reading passages for translation to show active and accurate comprehension.

### **TESTS OFFERED:**

There are five tests offered, depending on the level of the student. A syllabus for each exam may be found on the CAV website. The tests are:

- Latin I
- Latin II
- Intermediate Latin Prose
- Advanced Latin Prose: based upon prose authors including Cicero and Caesar, as well as Livy, Seneca, Pliny or others
- Advanced Latin Poetry: based upon authors such as Vergil, Catullus, Ovid, Horace, and other poets

## **STRUCTURE OF COMPETITION:**

Schools in Virginia may compete in one of three divisions:

- Alpha (secondary and intermediate public schools)
- Beta (independent and private schools)
- Gamma (charter, magnet, and governor's schools)

All teachers entering contestants MUST be members of the CAV.

Non-members may join by sending in dues with the Registration Form. Dues are \$20 per person. If this is your first year teaching Latin in Virginia, you are eligible for one year's free membership.

## **REGISTRATION:**

Teachers must submit their registration postmarked by **Friday**, **February 14**, **2020**. Competition fee is \$3.00 per student, non-refundable.

Try the tournament for free your first year! Your students may compete free of charge if your school is registering for the first time or has not registered in the past five years.

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#### THE LURLENE W. TODD TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD 2020

The CAV is proud to offer The Lurlene W. Todd Teacher of the Year Award to recognize our outstanding Latin teachers and professors in Virginia. This award is made possible through the generous donation of Wayne W. Wray in honor of his own Latin teacher, Lurlene Walker Todd.

## **ELIGIBILITY**

All teachers and professors of Classics who have taught successfully for at least three years in a public or private school (elementary, middle, high, college, or university) in Virginia and who are members in good standing of the Classical Association of Virginia by November 1 of the academic year of the award competition.

### **CRITERIA**

The criteria for this award are similar to those used for the Society for Classical Studies Awards for Excellence in Teaching at the Pre-collegiate Level. Applications are evaluated on at least four of the following factors:

- Evidence of the success, size, and growth of the teacher's program;
- Examples of innovative and creative classroom activity;
- Evidence of improved student learning;
- Significant numbers of students who continue their study of the classics at the next available level;
- Examples of outreach and promotion of the classics inside and outside of the teacher's institution;
- Evidence of the teacher's professional service and profession development;
- Student success in contests and competitions, especially those offered by the CAV;
- Examples of student travel and field trips which enhance learning and promote the program;

"WARNING: Storm Approaching": Weather, the Environment, and Natural Disasters in the Ancient Mediterranean

24th Annual Classics Graduate Student Colloquium, University of Virginia March 21, 2020

Keynote Speaker: Clara Bosak-Schroeder (University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign)

Scientific, aesthetic, and religious conceptions of weather events appear throughout Classical antiquity, as the Greeks and Romans attempted to make sense of environmental phenomena. Often, these events were explained as expressions of divine wrath or favor. Storms and natural disasters figured as literary devices, for example to delay narrative action or as metaphors for the cyclic nature of human life. Climate, broadly defined, was thought to determine national character, and weather played a critical role in military expeditions. Recently, scholars have made considerable advances in applying principles of bioarchaeology to the study of the ancient world. Hand in hand with these, theorists working with the tools of ecocriticism envision a humanities broader than humans, accounting for the whole natural world.

The study of weather and its public is particularly relevant today, as the severity of natural disasters increases annually. We face dramatic changes to the environment on a global scale, and the global response to these changes is a contentious and urgent matter. For this conference, we seek academic papers exploring natural disasters and environmental change in ancient Greece and Rome. We also welcome submissions from scholars whose work deals with the broader Mediterranean world, which includes but is not limited to Mesopotamia, the Levant, Anatolia, Egypt, Ethiopia, and North Africa. Some possible topics are:

- Storms and natural phenomena as literary motifs, metaphors, and/or similes
- Archaeological evidence for natural disasters or climate change
- Conceptions of environmental determinism
- The depiction of weather events in visual art
- The role of the gods in determining the weather and cult activity seeking to affect the weather or environment
- Historical consequences of weather and climate
- The relationship of ancient studies to the environmental humanities
- The present legacies of ancient environments

Each presenter will have 15-20 minutes to speak. Please send abstracts of no more than 300 words (not counting notes or bibliography) to Stephen Hill (<a href="mailto:rsh7bu@virginia.edu">rsh7bu@virginia.edu</a>) no later than 5pm EST on January 15, 2020.
