#### SPRING MEETING AT RANDOLPH-MACON COLLEGE

The 2024 CAV Spring Meeting, to be held Saturday, April 27th, at Randolph-Macon College, promises inspiration for our classrooms, our studies, and beyond.

First, Aliea Lewis, whose talk, "Who's that lady? Exploring Boccaccio's de Mulieribus Claris in the Latin classroom and beyond" will explore a later work by Giovanni Boccaccio that highlights famous women from real and mythological history. This work offers a fascinating perspective on familiar and new stories, and it provides a new challenge for curious Latin readers. Aliea earned her B.A. in Classical Languages at the University of Mary Washington and her M.A. in Classical Languages at the



University of Kentucky. She has been teaching at the middle and high school levels since 2010 and currently teaches at George Washington High School in Danville, VA.

Paul Hay will give the second talk of the day, "How the Romans Invented Periodization." We are accustomed to dividing histories into periods with distinct characteristics, but this mental habit comes with certain intellectual consequences. The Romans innovated this rhetoric of periodization near the end of their Republic, after the dictator Sulla adapted Etruscan divinatory



language for his political propaganda. Subsequent generations of Roman thinkers further evolved the discourse as a way to historicize various intellectual disciplines, setting the stage for a Roman temporal transition from Republican to Imperial time. Paul is a Visiting Assistant Professor

(and, starting July 1, Assistant Professor) at Hampden-Sydney College in Hampden-Sydney, VA. He graduated with his Ph.D. in Classics from the University of Texas at Austin in 2017. His research interests include Roman intellectual and social history, especially ancient environmental studies, as well as Roman literature of the late Republic and early Empire. His first monograph, published by University of Texas Press in August 2023, focuses on the saeculum and the Roman innovation of historical periodization.

Finally, we get to welcome home Emily Jusino and hear her "Bring it to Life: Using Performance Projects in the Classroom." Over her many years of teaching, she regularly incorporated performance and other creative projects into the classroom. She will go over some tips and techniques for working with such projects, including working with texts in the original languages, and share some of her own triumphs and



tragedies along the way. Emily has a B.A. in Theater and Classics from William and Mary, and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Classics from the University of Chicago, and she was a classics professor at Duke University and the University of Rochester. She taught classes in the languages and literature of the ancient Greek and Roman worlds. Her research focused on deception and stagecraft in Greek tragedy, and she has published several articles on ancient drama. She is also an experienced actor and has performed in multiple productions of ancient and modern plays. She is currently Assistant Director of the Office of Curriculum and Moderators at the Aspen Institute.

## NLE Announces New Test for 2025

The National Latin Exam is pleased to introduce a new exam for 2025! The **Beginning Latin Reading**Comprehension Exam, together with the Intermediate and Advanced Reading Comprehension Exams, will complete the sequence of exams designed for those Latin programs which emphasize reading and active Latin in their classrooms. Like the intermediate and advanced levels, the Beginning Latin Reading Comprehension Exam will feature 36 questions instead of 40 in order to allow students sufficient time to read and understand two crafted Latin passages appropriate for the level, and will incorporate a few questions about language and culture in the context of the passages - no stand alone questions!

## **UVA Classics Workshop**

The University of Virginia Center for the Liberal Arts and the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations Present A Classics Workshop for K–12 Teachers: Africa, African-American Culture, and the Classics

Saturday, April 13 9:00 am to 3:15 pm Virginia Humanities 946 Grady Ave., Charlottesville

As K-12 teachers and students grapple with issues of race and justice in history and society, there is value in bringing in perspectives that arise from two areas of contemporary classical studies. On the one hand, there is the place of Africa in the Greco-Roman imaginary, and how regions like Egypt and Ethiopia are involved in ancient constructions of the Other. At the same time, much exciting work is being done on the varied reception of Greek and Roman literature in African American literature and art, ranging from colonial times to today. This workshop will explore these topics via test cases in artistic and historical reflections on Africa, African-American Culture, and the Classics.

The program will include four 30-minute talks, each followed by general discussion, with an opening gathering and breaks, and lunch together. Presenters will include UVA faculty members along with faculty from Howard University and the College of William and Mary.

There will be two funded opportunities for teachers to develop teaching resources to be shared with all participants as a follow-up to the workshop.
