CAV Spring Meeting – William & Mary, May 2, 2026

We look forward to returning to The College of William & Mary for our Spring Meeting on Saturday, May 2nd, our first gathering in Williamsburg since 2014.

We will start the morning with coffee and breakfast treats compliments of the W&M Department of Classical Studies, as well as a chance to place bids in the annual Silent Auction to benefit our Professional Development Grant program. The business meeting will then commence, with reports and results from the Latin Tournament and the essay contests, as well as our various teacher and student awards and scholarships. We will also conduct our biennial election of officers. The program will then feature presentations on topics of scholarly and curricular interest, as well as a work session on the future of the Classical Essay Contest, and a ‘*Focus on...*’ segment.

Tina Salowey, of Hollins University, now *emerita*, has had a long-time commitment to the CAV. Professor Salowey is now in her second stint as director of the Classical Essay Contest. She will be leading a morning session in which we invite all attendees to help brainstorm and develop ideas on the future of the Classical Essay contest.

William & Mary’s own **Vassiliki Panoussi** will present a paper entitled “The Trophy as Witness: Trauma and Commemoration in Vergil’s *Aeneid*.” Professor Panoussi’s research focuses on Latin literature of the Late Republic and Early Empire, with a particular emphasis on Vergil. She also works on women and gender in antiquity and Greco-Roman religion. She is a prolific scholar of monographs, edited volumes, and journal articles on a wide range of topics in Greek and Latin literature, religion, gender, and classical reception. At William & Mary, she teaches a wide range of courses on Greek and Roman literature and culture, as well as all levels of Greek and Latin.

Charlaine Lunsford will present a ‘*Focus On...*’ session in the afternoon, casting a spotlight on “Latin in the Tidewater/Hampton Roads Area Schools.” Ms. Lunsford taught at Woodrow Wilson/Manor High School for 24 years and is now teaching at Great Bridge High in Chesapeake. She has been involved with CAV for 20+ years. She has served as a member-at-large and website editor, and, most recently, presented at the Fall 2024 meeting on the

changes to the AP curriculum based on her experience on the development committee. She has served on numerous committees and local organizations, attended conferences all over the region, and received several teaching awards.

Stephanie Buckler will finish the afternoon session with a presentation entitled, “*Scribamus Latine!* - Learn ways to get your students writing in Latin!” Ms. Buckler has been teaching Latin at Stafford High School for 8 years. At Stafford High School, she uses Comprehensible Input to build her students' acquisition of Latin through all modes of communication. She has presented at several FLAVA conferences on various topics such as games in the language Classroom, mixing culture and classroom management, and checking student knowledge on vocabulary in the target language. Currently, Ms. Buckler is the CAV K-12 Membership Chair and Convention and Finance Chair of the VJCL.

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### **Dickinson Summer Latin Workshop 2026:**

#### **Apuleius, Apologia (Pro se de magia)**

July 13–18, 2026

Apuleius's Apologia is a courtroom speech delivered in the mid-second century AD in the Roman province of Africa by the author, orator, and philosopher Apuleius of Madauros. Apuleius is better known today for his beloved novel, Metamorphoses or The Golden Ass. He stood accused of successfully using magical means to entice a wealthy widow into marriage in an effort to control her very substantial fortune. His accusers were relatives of Pudentilla, including her son (by her first husband) Pudens, and members of her first husband's family. The judge in the case was Claudius Maximus, who is known to have been governor of the province of Africa in AD 158-159, and is likely the same Maximus to whose teaching Marcus Aurelius pays tribute in Book 1 of the Meditations. The speech is unique in Latin literature, a literary-rhetorical tour de force, and a fascinating mine of information about ancient Roman daily life, magic, religion, toothpaste, and many other topics.

The fee for each participant is \$600 for those attending in person, \$400 for those attending online. The fee for in person attendees covers lodging, breakfast and lunch in the Dickinson cafeteria, the facilities fee, which allows access to the gym, fitness center, and the library, as well as wireless and wired internet access while on campus. The fee does not cover the costs of books or travel, or of dinners, which are typically eaten in the various restaurants in Carlisle. Please keep in mind that the participation fee, once it has been received by the seminar's organizers, is not refundable. This is an administrative necessity.

## Conventiculum Dickinsoniense 2026

July 6-11, 2026

The Conventiculum Dickinsoniense is an immersion seminar designed for those who want to acquire some ability at ex-tempore expression in Latin. A wide range of people can benefit from the seminar: professors in universities, teachers in secondary schools, graduate students, undergraduates, and other lovers of Latin, provided that anyone who considers applying has a solid understanding of the grammatical essentials of the Latin language. (Participants must be at least 18 years of age, unless accompanied by an adult guardian). A minimum requirement for participation is knowledge of Latin grammar and the ability to read a Latin text of average complexity – even if this reading ability depends on frequent use of a dictionary. But no previous experience in speaking Latin is necessary. Sessions will be aimed at helping participants to increase their ability to use Latin effectively in spoken discourse and to understand others speaking in Latin.

After the first evening reception (in which any language may be spoken), Latin will be the language used throughout the seminar. Participants will be involved in intensive activity each day from morning until early evening (with breaks for lunch and mid-afternoon pauses). They will experience Latin conversations on topics ranging from themes in literature and art all the way to the routines and activities of daily life, and will enjoy the benefits of reading and discussing texts in the target language. Activities will involve both written and spoken discourse, both of which engage the active faculties of expression, and each of which is complementary to the other. The seminar will not merely illustrate how active Latin can be a useful tool for teachers, it will show how developing an active facility in Latin can directly and personally benefit any cultivator of Latin who wishes to acquire a more instinctive command of the language and a more intimate relationship with Latin writings.

We can accept a maximum number of 35 participants. Deadline for applications is June 1, 2026. The participation fee for each participant will \$600. The fee includes lodging in campus housing (and please note that lodging will be in a student residence near the site of the sessions), two meals (breakfast and lunch) per day, as well as the opening dinner, and a cookout at the Dickinson farm. Included in this price is also the facilities fee, which allows access to the gym, fitness center, and the library, as well as internet access. The \$600 fee does not include the cost of dinners (except for the opening dinner and farm cookout), and does not include the cost of travel to and from the seminar. Dinners can easily be had at restaurants within walking distance from campus.

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### **MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: Mihaela Biliana Sati**

Please join me in getting to know our member, Mihaela Biliana Sati. Biliana received her Bachelor of Arts in Classics at West University of Timișoara, Romania in June 2000. She received a Masters in Spiritually Oriented Social Work Practice in 2023 and another Masters in Latin Patristics – Between Classicism and Modernity in 2025, both at West University of Timișorara.

After teaching Latin and Romanian for three years in Timișorara, she moved to Orangeburg, South Carolina and taught three years there. Since 2005, Biliana has taught Latin and mythology courses at Waynesboro High School along with her husband, a math teacher.

Biliana was born and raised in Timișorara by her Romanian father and Serbian mother. Her only sister and the rest of her family still live in Romania. Her favorite educational highlight thus far was a trip to Italy and Greece a few years ago when she visited with her students the sites about which she had been teaching for over twenty years.

She especially enjoys reading Seneca, especially his *Epitulae Morales ad Lucilium*. Biliana says his topics on true wisdom and true happiness that come from inner peace resonate closely to her personal beliefs.

Outside of classics, she reads mostly inspirational and motivational books. Biliana loves to cook, hike in nature, and spend time with her husband and their three children. In addition, she finds the time to support Samaritan's Purse, especially Project Operation Christmas Child, as well as Spirit FM radio.

When asked if she would do anything differently in her career, Biliana said that she would definitely focus on having her students speak Latin more, starting with easy TPRs, trying to have them listen and speak the language for an entire month, daily, and only after, to guide them in the writing process.

Her advice for beginning teachers: "Teaching Latin is one of the most rewarding experiences! But, it can also burn you out if you don't find time to recharge. Find time to connect with a community of those who love Latin, to encourage you and to learn from each other, just like CAV!"

The Classical Association of Virginia is pleased to offer TWO SCHOLARSHIPS for Latin students.

The **Wayne Wray Student Scholarship** is awarded thanks to an ongoing generous gift from Wayne W. Wray. This \$500.00 scholarship will be awarded to the student who most exemplifies a love of and the promotion of the classics. The Wayne Wray Scholarship will be awarded to a student who is passionate about Latin and has demonstrated enthusiasm on every level: in their daily classroom work, participation in club activities, and promotion of Latin within their school and/or community. While participation in CAV (and other) contests is preferred, the primary focus of this scholarship remains the student's ability to "spread the word" about classics and encourage others to study Latin.

**The Jim Bigger Memorial Scholarship**, funded by donations from CAV members, is given to honor the memory of long-time Virginia teacher and CAV member Jim Bigger. This \$500 scholarship will be awarded to a deserving senior who excels academically and who intends to continue their study of Latin and/or Greek in college.

Any CAV member may nominate any student who is taking or has completed four or more years of Latin and/or Greek. There may be more than one nominee per school. These scholarships are not based on financial need and are not renewable. Students and teachers do not need to indicate which award they are applying to – the selection committee will determine the two awards from all applicants. Send the teacher's nominating letter, the student's letter explaining his or her relationship with Latin and worthiness for either scholarship, and a list of honors and awards the student has earned to Donald Brewster at [donald\\_brewster@woodberry.org](mailto:donald_brewster@woodberry.org).
